

MR MAROO FOSELLA'S CURIOS,

PRESENTED TO THE BOROUGH

At last night's meeting of the Borough Council the following letter was received from Mr Marco Fosella:

On the eve of departing from Lovin I beg you to accept all the curios that I have been collecting during my stay in New Zealand. It is my wish that they shall be placed in the Public Library until such a time that, with the help of other citizens there will be sufficient quantity to start a museum.

If this offer is accepted kindly appoint somebody to make an inventory

and take delivery of the same.

The Mayor moved and Cr. Goldsmith seconded "that this Council on behalf of the residents of Levin and district accept with thanks from Mr Marco Fosella the generous gift of his collection of curios, and that his wishes contained in his letter be given effect to; also that a letter of thanks be sent to Mr Fosello."

In speaking to the motion the Mayor said Mr Fosella should be congratulated on his decision. He was the first citizen who had given such a gift which would from the nucleus of a museum. The Mayor mentioned that Mr Fosella was one of the oldest citizens of Levin. He had adways taken a keen interest in Borough affairs and had been a councillor for a number of years and he was arranging a public farewell.

MRS MARCO FOSELLA.

The death occurred yesterday in Wellington at the residence of her daughter, Mrs Ida Humphry, of an old and well-known resident of Levin in the person of Mrs Marco Fosella,

at the age of 66 years.

The deceased lady was lorn Florence, Italy, and was married at the age of 18 to the late Marco Fosella, coming to this country 47 ye rs ago. After some years' residence in Wellington, where her lashand was in business, she came to Levin about of years ago, when the district was just evolving from the native bush. During her long residence in Levin the late Mrs Fosella was justly popular for her sterling character and the breadth of sympathy which made her always anxious to render assistance where needed. She was visiting her daughter in Levin only last week and her sudden death will be a distinct shock to a large circle of friends. She is survived by three married daughters, Mesdames Haunphry (Wellington), C. Hook (Levin), and Goldsmith (Auckland), to whom the sympathy of the community will be extended in their sad loss.

Mr Marco Fosella, of Levin, is in receipt of a letter from the French Minister for War, intimating that a medal has been awarded to Mr Fosella for his part in the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71. Mr Fosella was through the Franco-Prussian War with the Franc-Tireurs.

A LOCAL MUSEUM

MR MARCO FOSELLA'S GIFT.

In the excellent collection of curios and historic articles which have been presented to the town by Mr Marco Fosella and which are now on exhibition at the library, there is he nucleus of a fine museum. More than that, Mr Fosella brought back from Tahiti a further collection, which he intends to add to his previous gift when sultable accommodation is provided for displaying them. Mr Fosella is a keen collector and observer of nature, and the hundred and one articles which he has got together form a valuable asset. With such an excellent start, the citizens of the town should not let the opportunity escape of adding to the collection, and finally securing proper accommodation and displaying the exhibition in an adequate way, thus providing a niuseum on a small scale that would do credit to the town. In the meantime

wanted, and the matter with that object in view might very well be taken into consideration by all who have the welfare and progress of the town at heart.

DEATH OF MR MARCO FOSELLA.

A WORTHY CITIZEN.

The news received in Levin on Saturday afternoon of the serious illness of Mr Marco Fosella, in Wellington, was unfortunately followed a little later by the advice of his death, an event that will be lamented by the community generally. The deceased was suffering from double pneumonia following on bronchial weakness of long standing.

The late Mr Fosella was born in the famous Italian city of Florence 75 years ago, his father being a distinguished Florentine engraver. After spending his boyhood in Italy, Mr Fosella travelled a good deal in Europe, eventually going into commercial pursuits in Paris, where he spent nine years. With the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War in 1870, he enlisted

for service in the International Ambulance and served in the Battle of Sedan and later as a franc-tireur. Mr Fosella held the 1870 medal and after the war joined the volunteers under the Republic, becaming a sergeant in After passing through this force. these eventful years, he decided to try his fortune abroad, and so in 1875 he sailed in the ship Gutenberg for New Zealand, arriving in Wellington after a voyage of a hundred days, which very nearly ended on a reef of rocks off Stewart Island, the vessel having a very narrow escape from being cast away. Mr Fosella had had experience of the clothing trade and he establisher a factory in Wellington that was very successful and his goods won me dals at the N.Z. Exhibition (1885), the and Colonial Exhibition Indian (1886) and the Paris Exposition (1891). When the Manawatu line was being opened up, Mr Fosella was one of those who had faith in the future of this coast, and he bought an 80-acre

block of land from the Railway Company at Koputaroa (or Kereru as it was then called). Here he went in for dairy farming, and finally settled in Levin, where he engaged in the drapery and clothing business and went in for fruit-growing.

The late Mr Fosella was, both in deed and spirit, 'a citizen of country wherein, for the time being, he was resident, and just as he did not hesitate to serve France against the German invader, he cheerfully took his share of civic and social duty in New Zealand. In Levin he was a generous patron of sport, a willing worker in many local societies, a keen critic of municial affairs, and a regular and incisive newspaper corres-Local and district progress owes much to his initiative and enthusiasm. As well as being interested in the practical side of fruit culture, he was the first secretary of the Horowhenua Fruit-growers' Association,

and a persistent advocate of the establishment of canning works in Levin. He sat on the Borough Council for several terms, was a member of the School Committee and captain of the Boating Club. An elaborate plan of improvements at the Lake drawn to his design is still in existence as evidence of the possibilities he could seen in this fine piece of water. The Hokib Beach found in him a strong advocate, and generally he was found using his talents and activities for worthy local objects. During the war period he devoted himself to the interests of the fighting men, and he kept a valuable record of the soldiers who went from this district. on he took a keen interest in the proposals for the erection of a fitting me morial to our soldiers. The late Mr Fosella leaves a permanent evidence of his association with Levin in the foundation of the local museum at pre sent housed in the Library. This in

teresting and varied collection of curios, which he had assembled during the travels of a lifetime, formed a valuable gift to the town, which was gratefully accepted by the Borough Council on behalf of the community. On his last visit to Levin a few weeks ago, Mr Fosella made what proved to be his last gift to the town in the shape of a seat for the memorial gardens, and this is ready to be handed over. From this brief account of the deceased gentleman's activities in Levin it will be seen that he did not spare himself in the public good, and his death will therefore be regretted for public as well as private reasons. On many questions he took an independnt stand, but he was at the same time a man of broad views, generous impulses and warm friendships. Cosmopolitan in his toleration and outlook, he all the more appreciated the freedom and opportunities he enjoyed in a British Dominion, and while still evincing a pardonable pride in the land of his birth, he was a loyal

and self-sacrificing citizen of the country that was his home for so many years. His passing hence will bring a genuine sense of loss to a host of friends in Levin, and his widow and family are assured of the town's sincere sympathy.

The late Mr Fosella was the younger of the two sons of Giovanni Fosella, of Florence, many of whose works of engraving are regarded as masterpieces in the world of art. The elder brother, Joseph, has held an important position in the Italian Government Arsenal for many years.

Mr Fosella married in Italy, and is survived by a widow and family of three daughters: Mrs D. Hook (Levin), Mrs Humphry (Wellington), and Mrs Goldsmith (Auckland).

He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, a companion of the French Constitution, and one of the very few Masons of that Order in the Dominion.

Mr Marco Fosella, formerly of Levin, wrote from Auckland to the Borough Council last evening, forwarding four packages of curios, which he asked should be accepted as an addition to the proposed museum for Levin. The Mayor (Mr D. W. Matheson) said it was very pleasing to receive such a welcome addition to Mr. Fosella's former gift to the proposed museum, and he was worthy of the thanks of the town. It was proposed to house the gifts at the library, and each article would be named and properly displayed. On the Mayor's motion, a vote of thanks was passed to the donor.
